1. Roll Call

Chair Sandi Thompson called the meeting to order and ordered the Secretary of the Board to call the roll for the Advancement & Communications Committee.

*3. Approval of Minutes – May 12, 2016

Chair Thompson moved to approve the minutes. The minutes were approved as amended.

4. External Relations: Updates

4.1 Fall 2016 UC Hastings Magazine

Director of External Relations Alex Shapiro gave an update on the fall 2016 UC Hastings magazine. He reported that the fall edition will focus on students learning to work at the frontier of law and science. In addition, the magazine will introduce the two new Board of Directors, Director Simona Agnolucci and Director Courtney Power. There will be a story about the Board of Trustees' challenge to raise \$1 million for the Building UC Hastings campaign.

4.2 UC Hastings Community Partnership

Director of External Relations Shapiro reported that UC Hastings is expecting a conferred Good Neighbor status on the development project from Market Street for the Masses Coalition—a group of non-profits in the area. He also mentioned the regular meetings with members of the UC Hastings

community at which students, faculty, and alumni discuss how they can get involved in the Tenderloin community.

4.3 UC Hastings in the News

Director of External Relations Shapiro reported that since May, there have been about 307 articles that mentioned UC Hastings or UC Hastings faculty members and 705 million unique views.

5. Building UC Hastings Campaign Update

Chair Thompson gave an update on the Building UC Hastings campaign. She reported that there are blue-ribbon asks of about \$3.5 million. This campaign has also improved regular annual fundraising. Professor Leo Martinez reported that the UC Hastings Foundation committed to raise \$1 million and has raised \$984,000 as of this date. Professor Martinez anticipates that by the next full Board of Directors meeting, the UC Hastings Foundation will have raised the full \$1 million. This money is in addition to regular annual fundraising.

6. FY16 Final Fund-raising results

6.1 Fundraising Comparison Raised Report

Chief Development Officer Eric Dumbleton reported a twenty percent increase in funds raised from new pledges and straight gifts, stemming from the efforts around the Building UC Hastings campaign. Chief Development Officer Dumbleton projected that there will be a little over \$1 million in pledge payments for the existing fiscal year.

6.2 Fundraising Comparison Received Report

Chief Development Officer Dumbleton reported that thus far, fundraising is down ten percent from fiscal year 2015. However, the amount of unrestricted cash is up for received fundraising.

7. Fiscal Year Outlook

This item will be presented at the next meeting.

8. Staffing Update

Chief Development Officer Dumbleton gave an update on staffing changes in the Development Department. Currently, he is recruiting for two positions.

Chair of the Board of Directors Tom Gede informed everyone that the Hawaii gala would take place in September. The Hawaiian alumni raise significant sums for students' scholarships.

Chief Development Officer Dumbleton gave an update on the reunion weekend scheduled for October 21, 2016. Events will take place in the Louis B. Mayer Lounge. He also mentioned the upcoming Mark Leno event scheduled for September 30, 2016 at the Tenderloin Museum.

Faculty, Staff, & Student Buzz

Congratulations to Professor **Reuel Schiller**, whose book *Forging Rivals: Race, Class, Law, and the Collapse of the Collapse of Postwar Liberalism*, received the John Phillip Reid Award from the American Society of Legal History (ASLH). The award is given annually "for the best monograph by a mid-career or senior scholar, published in English in any of the fields defined broadly as Anglo-American legal history."
